Polling Memo Florida Pre-Election Day Poll November 2, 2022



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Executive Summary

Over the past several days, Victory Insights conducted a poll investigating some of the most important elections and issues facing Florida voters. Specifically, we surveyed voters across the state of Florida on the race for US Senate, the race for Governor, and local congressional races. Additionally, we asked voters for their reaction to Governor DeSantis's administration's response to Hurricane Ian, as well as their stances on abortion and inflation. Finally, we broke the electorate down by party affiliation and asked them questions pertaining specifically to their party. Here are some of the key takeaways:

- We expect the race for US Senate to be much closer than the race for Governor. Our poll gives Rubio only a 4-point advantage over Demings, while DeSantis has a 12.7-point advantage over Crist.
- Florida voters are split relatively evenly across the issues. Neither side of the abortion or inflation issues seems to have a commanding lead.
- Floridians are also split about the 2024 presidential race, even within their own party. Republicans are 50/50 on Trump/DeSantis, and nearly half of Democrats want someone other than Biden as their 2024 nominee.
- There does seem to be relatively more agreement that Governor DeSantis and his administration have done a good job responding to Hurricane Ian.
- As of today, 49% of the Florida electorate leans right, while 42% leans left.

Ben Galbraith, Senior Pollster at Victory Insights, says:

"Florida Republicans certainly have the advantage in this year's statewide elections, but that's no surprise. What's more surprising is how some statewide Republicans, namely DeSantis, are expected to perform much more strongly than other statewide Republicans, namely Rubio."

"Our polling numbers suggest a connection between the strong positive response to DeSantis's hurricane recovery efforts and DeSantis's dominant lead over Crist. A majority of nonpartisan voters — and even a large swath of Democrats — approve of DeSantis's response to the storm. That, coupled with DeSantis's general popularity in the broader political world and the intense support for him that Florida Republicans harbor, makes DeSantis an extremely difficult candidate to defeat. Unless something crazy happens between now and Election Day, expect DeSantis to cruise to a comfortable victory over Crist. As for Rubio... we'll just need to wait and see."



Today, if Florida were 100 people...



26 would be Deep Blue Democrats. These 26 people identify as Democrats and are planning on voting a straight Democratic ticket (Demings, Crist, and their local Democratic congressional candidate).

7 would be Light Blue Democrats. These 7 people identify as Democrats, but they're not sure they'll be voting for all Democrats this year.

9 would be Tilt Blue NPAs. These 9 people don't identify with either party, but still tend to support Democrats more often.

In total, 42 people would lean left.

37 would be Deep Red Republicans. These 37 people identify as Republicans and are planning on voting a straight Republican ticket (Rubio, DeSantis, and their local Republican congressional candidate).

6 would be Light Red Republicans. These 6 people identify as Republicans, but they're not sure they'll be voting for all Republicans this year.

6 would be Tilt Red NPAs. These 6 people don't identify with either party, but still tend to support Republicans more often.

In total, 49 people would lean right.

9 would be True Neutrals. These 9 people don't identify with either party, and don't tend to support one party over another.
